Important Information to Students

I. Programme: M.A. in English

- II. Eligibility: At least 50% marks in the bachelor's degree with at least 50% marks in English as an Optional Subject OR at least 50% marks in the bachelor's degree with at least 55% marks in any literature / English as a Compulsory Subject.
- III. The minimum duration for completion of the programme is four semesters (two academic years) and the maximum duration is eight semesters (four academic years) or as per the amendments made by the regulatory bodies from time to time.
- IV. A student should attend at least 75% of the classes, seminars, and practical in each course of study.
- V. All the courses in the programme carry a Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) component for a maximum of 40 marks and an End Semester Examination (SEE) for a maximum of 60 marks. The minimum pass mark for a course is 40%.
- VI. The student is given 3 Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) tests per semester in each course from which the best 2 performances are considered for calculating the marks in CIA. A record of the continuous assessment is maintained by the academic unit. The 3 internal tests are conducted for 15 Marks each, out of the best 2 tests scores are considered for 30 marks. Out of the remaining 10 marks, 5 marks are awarded for assignments, class presentations and class participation of the students and the remaining 5 marks are awarded for punctuality, and attendance of the student.
- VII. A student should pass separately in both the CIA and the SEE, i.e., a student should secure 16 (40% of 40) out of 40 marks in the CIA and 24 (40% of 60) out of 60 marks in the end semester examination.

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VIII. A student failing to secure the minimum pass marks in the CIA is not allowed to take the

end-semester examination of that course. S/he must redo the course by attendingspecial

classes for that course and get a pass percentage in the internal tests to become eligible

to take the end-semester examination.

- IX. A student failing a course due to lack of attendance should redo the course.
- X. Re-evaluation is applicable only for theory papers and shall not be entertained for other components such as dissertations, etc.
- XI. An on-campus elective course is offered only if a minimum of ten students or 40% of the students registered, whichever is higher, exercise their option for that course.
- XII. Assessment Pattern: 40% of internal [formative evaluation -- two best out of three tests (for a maximum of 15 marks each = 30 marks) -- and seminar /assignments/ attendance (10 marks)] and 60% (summative evaluation -- end of semester examination)
